December 5 – Holiday Hike

HOLIDAY HIKE – SF, December 5. Leader: Sets Amann. On a delightfully warm, and sparkling clear, evening in SF, seventeen eager walkers gathered together in front of the Ferry Building on the

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Embarcadero. We fortified with some French madeleine cookies before beginning our walk toward our first stop at the base of the Pier 39 Christmas tree. There we rested among colorful sea lion sculptures and had our group photo taken. We proceeded around the wharf's enormous lighted Ferris wheel, and marveled at the possible views of the bay that might be seen from its very top. We continued on to North Beach and our restaurant destination of Piazza Pellegrini on Washington Square. On exiting we had the lovely experience of a colorful floodlit SS Peter and Paul Church with a rising moon over Coit Tower...a real photo op! We soldiered on through the colorful North Beach neighborhood and onto Grant Avenue in Chinatown, where many beckoning shops were open. Our final destination was Union Square which did not disappoint. An enormous, sparkling lighted Christmas tree in front of the Macy's building's windows decorated with wreaths and lights, as well as music and performers skating on the ice rink made for a spectacular ending to a festive evening. - Carol Savio

PLEASANTON RIDGE, December 8. Leaders: Colette Cussary and Diane Cannon. On a perfect day for hiking, we met at Foothill Staging Area in Pleasanton Ridge Regional Park. We took off on Oak Tree Trail with two guests and 14 club members. We hiked over 7 miles with an elevation climb of 1500'. Hiking Oak Tree we connected with Ridgeline and walked on olives fallen from the trees onto the trail next to the orchards. The orchards were planted between 1890 and the 1920s. From there we crossed over to the Thermalito Trail, named after the Thermal Fruit Company which operated from 1904 until the 1930s producing dried fruits. Non-irrigated orchards included apricot, cherry, prune, and almonds. At lunch some of us ate in the olive grove and others went to the top of the ridge where we could see Brushy Peak, Mt. Diablo, Mission Peak, Ohlone Wilderness Area, and the San Antonio Reservoir. Parallel faults lie on both sides of Pleasanton Ridge. To the west is the Stonybrook-Palomares fault and to the east are the Calaveras and Sunol faults. Although we had a spare the air day we could still see for miles from the top of the ridge. - Colette Cussary
